CHEROKEE COUNTY

Uninsured rates are high among those working in construction, retail, and food service. These fields rarely offer health insurance to employees. In this county, for instance, 30.9% of residents work in these industries. Without employer-provided health insurance, it can be nearly impossible for people to get health care when they need it.

What is the "Coverage Gap"?
