



### Health Care Can't Wait: Early Childhood Educators

#### Coverage Gap Stories: Annie

Name: Anni

Location: Wilmington, NC

Career in early childhood: 20+ years

"Many of my friends in New Hanover county are hard workers but can't afford health insurance, so they go without it." Annie has not had health insurance since 2011 when she graduated college. She works full-time in early education, and is also enrolled at UNC-W to obtain her teacher's license and become a public school teacher. She's able to get family planning at a local non-profit, and dental care thanks to a new plan with her employer. Recently Annie developed impetigo, a staph infection, and was very concerned about passing it on to the children. She babysits and pet-sits for a doctor, who generously wrote her a



#### NORTH CAROLINA

Uninsured rates are high among those working in construction, retail, and food service. These fields rarely offer health insurance to employees. In North Carolina, for instance, 26,4% of residents work in these industries. Without employer-provided health insurance, it can be nearly impossible for people to get health care when they need it.




